




At least two cities outperform the average EU in 4 out of 5 areas






Cities' uneven performance across the different areas measured reveals opportunities for reform and exchange of good practices






Hungarian cities are the fastest yet the most expensive in starting a business






The share of new companies using online registration varies widely among Bulgaria, Hungary and Romania






Obtaining a building permit takes the least time on average in Romanian cities—but obtaining other preconstruction approvals the most time






Dealing with construction permits takes almost 70 days less in Sofia than in Ruse





Getting electricity is a faster process in Romanian cities—but also a costly one






Getting electricity in Varna is 2 months faster than in Sofia—however, time in both cities is among the longest compared globally






Hungarian cities stand out for efficiency and quality in property registration, but also for a more expensive process






5 Hungarian cities and Timisoara would rank among the 10 top economies globally in the ease of commercial dispute resolution








If all local good practices were adopted, the global performance of each country would improve





Peer to peer learning in Poland

Example: Reducing the time and cost to start a business in 2 lagging regions



- ✓ Kielce and Rzeszow had some of the least efficient start-up procedures among 18 cities.
- ✓ These cities looked to Poznan—
 there most registrations take
 place online in 8 days (4 weeks
 faster).
- ✓ They also looked to **Gdansk** to improve the paper registration system, which is 40% faster.
- ✓ A judge from Bialystok advised on dealing with spikes in demand.
